## Minutes of General Membership Meeting –

### Attendance: 62 Members & 2 Visitors

President Helen Treend called the meeting to order. Helen thanked Donna Iiams for all her hard work as the Guild Historian and the wonderful job she did on the scrapbook of the guild. Helen thanked two people who were not honored for their work during the quilt show this year. She gave certificates to Dolores Wagner and Judi Cooper. Helen announced that she had tickets for the Salishan Christmas Tour of Homes if anyone is interested. It takes place on December 3rd and included five homes. Helen then thanked Jennifer Reinhart for filling in as Secretary for the month of November.

Minutes of the October 13th meeting were approved as printed.

**Treasurer's Report:** Debra Hanson reported a bank balance of \$6089.17 and a community services grant balance of -\$0.20. Reimbursement forms and equipment forms are online. Debra announced that all reimbursement forms need to be turned in by the end of the year for reimbursement for the 2005 year.

**Program:** Jan Hoffman read a thank you card from Crys Kyle who taught the Kaleidoscope workshop in October. Rosalie Raudsep announced that the program for December will be the Round Robin revealing along with the potluck and reminded everyone that there will be no gift exchange. Rosalie then introduced the four guild members who attended the Paducah Quilt Show and classes in April. Dani Flaig, Paulette Stenberg, Twy Hoch, and Karen Oetjen shared their experiences from their trip. They showed samples of their work, pictures, and shared many enjoyable stories. They donated a book they received on their trip to the guild library.

### Election of Officers:

Paulette Stenberg announced the nominees: President: Jeann'e Butler, Vice President: Gretchen Jolie, Secretary: Jean Maupin, Treasurer: Debra Hanson. Rose Shaw made a motion to approve the election of the candidates. Ruth Peterson seconded the motion and it was passed.

**Refreshments:** Hostesses for the meeting were Marie Lake and Jennifer Reinhart.

### Committee Reports:

**Hostessing:** Cheryl Mottner announced that the Hostessing Chairman position still needs to be filled for 2006. Berta Beachell volunteered for the position. However, she insisted that members need to start stepping up and volunteering to be a hostess for a meeting. She said when she held the position a few years back she brought food five months out of the year because people would not volunteer or they would back out at the last second. Cheryl also announced that members need to bring a dish and their own table setting for the December meeting.

**Membership:** Carol Culton announced the attendance of 62 members and 2 guests who joined the guild.

**Finance:** Jean Amundson said that the proposed budget in the last newsletter is balanced. Fran Whited made a motion to approve the budget. Ruth Peterson seconded and it was passed.

**Workshops:** Linda MacKown announced that the dates for the machine quilting workshops in January have changed due to scheduling conflicts with the instructor and the church. The Beginning Machine Quilting workshop will be on Friday, January 6th and the intermediate machine quilting workshop will be on Friday, January 20th. Jean Amundson talked about the Workshop Evaluation Form. Members are encouraged to submit an evaluation form for any of the workshops taught during the 2005. Forms can be obtained from any of the workshop committee members.

**Field Trips:** Denise DeMarie said there are no field trips planned and the last one was cancelled due to lack of

would help the new committee chair with planning the field trips for 2006.

**Documentation:** Twy Hoch said there are no new dates as of yet. When they get scheduled they will be listed in the newsletter. She thinks there will be 6 dates, one extra to make up for the missed date this year. Twy announced that she is selling raffle tickets for a quilt she donated to the Waldport Library. The drawing will be at the Waldport Library on December 3rd. Twy also announced that the Mariners Quilt is at the Newport Historical Society Museum waiting to be quilted. If any members have time to quilt please stop by. The museum is closed on Mondays.

**Community Quilts:** Dolores Wagner said 163 quilts have been given away. She always has a list of where the quilts go at every meeting. Members are welcome to see the list. She asked that if any member has a place where the quilts are needed to let the committee know. The committee took in 3 quilt tops at the meeting. The Knotty Ladies tie community quilts the last Wednesday of each month at the Senior Center. Members are welcome to join them. One of the feet is missing from the quilt frame from the senior center. Does anyone know where it is? Quilt tying for November and December have been cancelled. Debra Hanson announced that the guild has received a \$2500 grant from the Siletz Tribe for Community Quilts!

**Charm Squares:** Liz Ritchie said 18 members signed up for December and the color is green.

**Challenge Quilt 2006:** Shirley Gilmore and Donna Iiams are the committee chairs for 2006. Members who brought an ugly fat quarter drew a new fat quarter for the challenge. The drawing will continue in December. Rules for the challenge are available when you pick up your fat quarter.

**Round Robin:** Paulette Stenberg explained that it will be a "straight robin" for 2006. Signup will continue at the December meeting and the event will start in January and will feature a 45x45 finished project with a Christmas theme. Exchange dates will be Feb, April, June, Sept, Nov. with the revealing in December. It will then need to be finished for the 2007 quilt show.

## Minutes of Executive Board Meeting –

President Helen Treend called the meeting to order and announced the presence of a quorum (13 present and 5 guild members). Helen welcomed new board members and new committee chairman.

**Minutes of the October 20th Meeting:** Helen announced a change that she did not leave the meeting at 12:05 as recorded but at 1:05. The rest of the minutes were approved as printed in the newsletter.

**Treasurer's Report** was given by Jeann'e Butler. Total expenses from 12/1/04-11/17/05 are \$18,670.06 with a net income of \$661.92. The bank balance is \$5,298.90 with a community service balance of -\$30.20.

### Committee Reports:

**By Laws:** Carol Culton handed out proposed organization changes. She explained how the new organization would give voting privileges to some committees and no voting privileges to auxiliary committees. The way it is set up now we need 10% of the guild to have a quorum at the board meetings. Committees have been collapsed down in order to form a smaller quorum. One of the biggest changes is having field trips, block of the month, challenge quilt, charm squares, hostessing, library, round robin, program development, and show and tell under one committee named "Meeting & Program Activities". All of these sub-committees would be under one chairman and the group as a whole would only have one vote at the board meeting. With the proposed organization changes there would be 11 committees and 4 officers. 50% of voting members plus one officer is needed for a quorum. Therefore, only 8 committee members plus one officer is needed to satisfy the quorum.

Members can serve on more than one committee but are entitled to only one vote. Since this is a change in the bylaws members will have to vote on the proposed organization changes, which will supersede the changes set forth in September of 2004.

Motion by Linda MacKown to publish the proposed organizational changes and a voting ballot in the December newsletter. Seconded by Dani Flaig and passed with no opposition.

Members want to get the newly published directory earlier in the year. The bylaws were referred to and Carol Culton found a discrepancy. There is a statement about dues on page 21 of the directory under Membership Section 2 and a statement on page 28 under Financial Section C.

Motion to remove item C under Financial (pg 28). Nan Scott seconded and

passed with no opposition.

The bylaw stands that dues are due and payable in December and delinquent after the January General Meeting.

Jeann'e Butler read from the bylaws and in summary stated that the installation of officers should take place at the December meeting not in November. Helen explained that she handed over some information and keys to Jeann'e today to alleviate any stress or confusion and to make sure things would be organized and prepared for the next officer. The gavel, however, will not be turned over until the December General Meeting.

**Round Robin:** Paulette Stenberg said 19 people have signed up and sign ups will continue through the December meeting. Participants will get their bags and directions in January and the first exchange will begin in February. The revealing will be December 2006 at the general meeting with a 'little' and 'grand' prize drawing. Participants will then need to have their round robins done and ready for entry into the 2007 quilt show.

**Newsletter:** Nan Scott announced that she has 14 members who have agreed to receive the newsletter via the web. 3-4 people are getting the newsletter by mail and via the web. Nan also announced she has one commitment for advertising for a full year – Quilters Cove. Nan encourages members to obtain an advertising price sheet and pass them out if you visit out of town quilt shops or sewing centers or to bring back business cards to her so she can contact them regarding advertising.

### Old Business:

**House Block Project for 2007 Raffle Quilt:** Helen read the guidelines aloud. Cheryl Mottner stated the house blocks would be voted on at the 2006 quilt show. The blocks not voted into the raffle quilt would then be available to makers of the blocks through a raffle. For more info you can contact Cheryl Mottner until May '06 and Suzanne Dandoy starting in May '06. The complete guidelines will be available on the guild website.

Helen announced openings for committees for 2006. The chairperson for the quilt show is in high demand. Someone needs to step up and take the position. Jeann'e Butler has in place guidelines and instructions for the position. The calendar and guidelines for the quilt

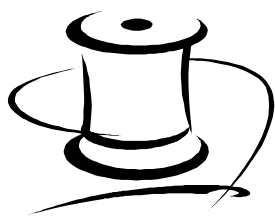


## November's Program Features the Paducah Four

The name of this mutual benefit corporation shall be Oregon Coastal Quilters Guild.

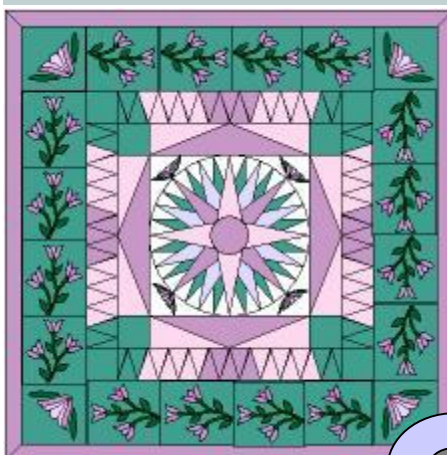
**PURPOSE:**

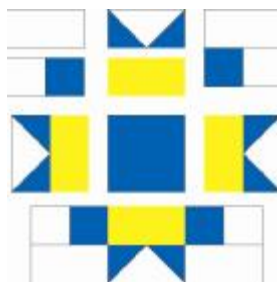
As a member of the Oregon Coastal quilter's Guild, Peggy looks forward to meeting people and learning new things.

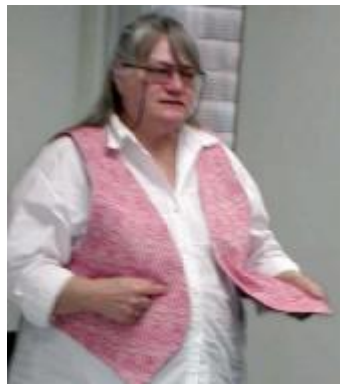

**BEGINNING MACHINE QUILTING**, Friday, January 6, 10-4, at ALC. Instructor: Ginny Kelly. \$32. Do you want to machine quilt some of those UFOs but don't know how? This workshop will be a great help in leaning and improving your machine quilting skills and techniques. We'll work on free motion quilting and will cover various quilting techniques. Note: for this class we will use thread a couple of shades darker so we can see the quilting stitches. **SKILL LEVEL:** Beginner to Intermediate. It is important to know how to operate your machine and use your attachments. Bring owners manual for your machine.

**INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED MACHINE QUILTING**, Friday, January 20, 10-4, at ALC. Instructor: Ginny Kelly. \$32. Okay, so you know how to free motion quilt but don't think you're "good enough"? Here's a really good way to improve your machine quilting skills and learn new techniques. Pre-meet with Ginnie to discuss quilting design and thread colors on January 8th or 11th between 1 & 3. Call Ginny at 994-5476 to arrange specific time and place. **SKILL LEVEL:** Intermediate/Advanced. It is important to know how to operate your machine and use your attachments. Bring owner's manual for your machine.

**THORNBUSH OF THE CASCADES**, Friday & Saturday, February 10 & 11, 10-4, at ALC. Instructors: Jan Bressler and Lou Shafer from Jannilou's in Philomath. \$65, includes pattern (Pattern will be ordered after the December meeting and will be available at the January meeting). New York Beauty-like sunbursts radiate from the center of this gorgeous quilt into pools of batiks. Multi-dimensional stars surround the center medallion and are then dramatically enhanced by a sawtooth spike border. Thornbush blossoms are appliquéd in your favorite method once the quilt top is complete. This is one of Judy Niemeyer's newest patterns using her unique paper foundation methods. She takes nearly all the complication out of the intricate piecing. Jan & Lou rate this class as being for advanced beginners. Rocky Mountain Thornbush pattern by Judy Niemeyer is required.

**SEWING CURVES FROM STRIPS**, Saturday, March 11, 2006 from 10-4 at ALC. Instructor: Denise DeMarie. Fool proof yet easy curved piecing—The easiest curve sewing you'll ever do! Look for more information at the next guild meeting and in the next newsletter.

## Quilter's Corner

I have decided to devote some column space in the Fat Quarter News each month to quilting related tips and 'how to' questions. ## Dear Harriet,

I have been participating in the Block of the Month program at my guild, and no matter what I do, I can't seem to make my blocks come out the right size. I use 1/4 inch seams. I've even marked with tape on my sewing machine so that I can be accurate. It seems that the more complicated the block, the further off are my measurements. Help!

*Caught Short in Yachats*

Dear Short,

This is a case when a quarter of an inch is not a quarter of an inch. When you have a block that is complicated—many pieces, many seams, the finished size of the block may be smaller than expected because each seam gobbles up more than you think. In reality your seams should be a 'scant' quarter of an inch because the thread and the fabric when pressed will take an additional approximately 1/32nd of an inch. If your sewing machine has the feature that allows you to set the needle position, move it one click to the right and then use your 1/4 inch tape guide as you sew. If your machine does not have that feature, move your tape to the left by 1/32nd of an inch. Press each seam as you sew and measure as you go so that you can make adjustments as necessary. And relax—as you gain more experience, you won't be caught short.

## A Bag of Tricks

Recently at an impromptu lunch gathering of several quilters, Paulette Stenberg shared this frustration saver.

Have you ever been working on a project that has multiple thick layers, seams, curves and corners (a quilted bag or purse comes to mind) and you have been frustrated with trying to keep all of those layers aligned while sewing on your machine? Straight pins bend like boomerangs and you have to close the door of your sewing room for fear someone might think there is a sailor in the house!

Paulette's tip is elegant—Use a clothes pin at the edge to keep the layers aligned and together. You can stitch along the seam line and then reposition the clothes pin as necessary. A binder clip for paper would also work well.

And now you can open the sewing room door.

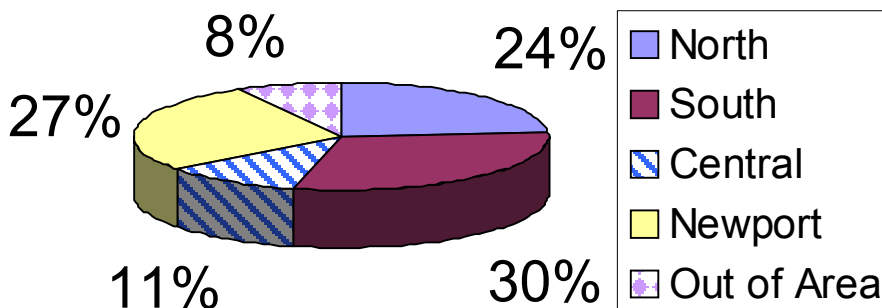

## Where We Live

I have been working on the membership directory information as I prepare to format next year's directory for printing. I had assumed that most of our membership live in Newport, but that is actually not the case. We range all the way from Gresham to Yachats and more than sixty percent of the membership travel more than fifteen miles to come to meetings.

The pie chart to the right illustrates the distribution. Twenty-four percent live north of Newport while thirty percent live more than fifteen miles to the south. Eleven percent live near Newport and eight percent are out of the area and rarely attend meetings.





# Proposed Changes to the OCQG By-Laws

In November 2004 the Oregon Coastal Quilters Guild By-laws were changed to remove the distinction between standing and auxiliary committees. One consequence of this change was that all committees were made a part of the executive board and (with the exception of By-laws and Nominating) given voting rights. Another consequence was that obtaining a quorum for board meetings became a challenge, indeed a burden. The executive board now had 25 members (one per committee, the officers and the parliamentarian). Since a quorum is defined as one-half of the number of members of the executive board plus one, thirteen people were needed to form a quorum (13 people is a bit more than 10 percent of the membership of the guild). To alleviate this problem, organizational changes were pro-

posed to the board in the November meeting and were approved by the board. The following changes vary in format but not in content from the draft proposed to the board.

In these organizational changes the number of committees has been reduced to fourteen, however three of these committees (Audit, by-laws and Nominating) do NOT have voting rights. With these remaining eleven committees, the four officers and the parliamentarian (16 voting representatives), only nine representatives are required for a quorum.

Note that the new committee structure consolidates many former activities by forming subcommittees. The most comprehensive reorganization has been in restructuring the former Program Committee into the Program and Activities Committee. This committee chair-

person will now have the responsibility for the program, table walk and other activities that take place at a meeting. Each subcommittee chairperson will handle their defined responsibility but would not be required to attend board meetings.

Essentially, the new structure makes the president the Chief Executive Officer, the Treasurer the Chief Financial Officer and the Program and Activities Committee Chairperson the Chief Executive Officer of the guild.

Please review these changes carefully because they will be voted on no later than the membership meeting to be held on January 13, 2006. A ballot is included on page 11.

## Proposed Organization Changes

These changes replace Sections 1 and 2 of Article VII, Committees. They are on pages 23, 24 and 25 of the 2005 Membership directory.

Section 1: Committee Chairpersons shall serve as voting members of the Executive Board except the Chairpersons of Audit, By-Laws, and Nominating.

Section 2: The committees and their responsibilities shall be:

- A. AUDIT - Audit the OCQG books as specified in the procedures.
- B. BY-LAWS: Maintain and review the By-laws, Standing Rules and Policy of the Guild for fairness and accuracy.
- C. COMMUNITY SERVICE: Coordinate all OCQG community service and charity activities.
- D. DOCUMENTATION: Locate and document quilts made prior to 1960

that now belong to residents of Lincoln County.

- E. FINANCE: Oversee all OCQG financial and fund raising activities and prepare the annual budget. Subcommittees include:

- Raffle quilt ticket sales
- Quilters surprise
- Special projects raffle
- Other

- F. HISTORY: Document the activities and traditions of the OCQG by taking photographs, maintaining photo albums and scrapbooks, and archiving ephemera related to the guild.

- G. MEMBERSHIP: Coordinate all membership activities including recruitment, roster maintenance, and membership meeting attendance records. Subcommittees include:

- Membership directory
- Records keeping and coordination
- New Member Buddy
- Other

- H. NEWSLETTER: Publish and distribute a newsletter regularly to inform members of activities and events.

- I. NOMINATING - Seek candidates for the elected offices (President, Vice-president, Secretary and Treasurer) among the OCQG membership.

- J. PROGRAM AND ACTIVITIES: Responsible for the non-business part of membership meetings, and coordinates all regular membership meeting activities. Subcommittees include:

- Block of the month
- Challenge
- Charm squares
- Field Trips
- Hostessing
- Library
- Program development (speakers, presentations, etc)
- Round Robin
- Show and Tell
- Other

- K. PUBLICITY: Distribute information to the media concerning all OCQG meetings and events.

- L. QUILT SHOW: Conduct the annual quilt show as specified in the OCQG Quilt Show Procedures Manual.

- M. RAFFLE QUILTS: Prepare an annual raffle quilt. Subcommittees include:

- Current year's raffle quilt
- Next year's raffle quilt

- N. WORKSHOPS: Organize and schedule all workshops for the current term, and be authorized to schedule and make commitments for future years.

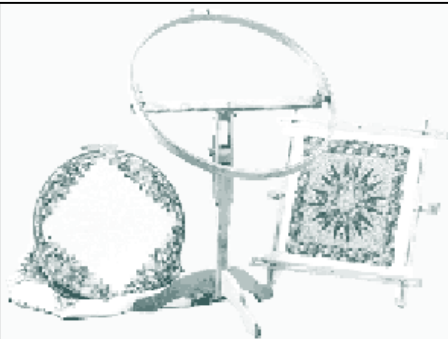

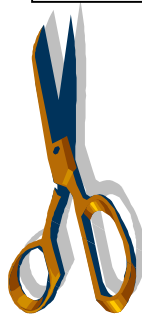
