"MAN-QUILTER" ROB APPELL WILL SHOW ALL AT APRIL MEETING



In his own words, Rob Appell is a "man who loves to sew and I'm proud of it." He will be presenting a trunk show of his work at the April 9 OCQG meeting. Rob is a textile artist and designer. He has designed quilts for Michael Miller Fabrics, has published several books and DVDs as well as numerous patterns. Inventing sewing and quilting tools is another of Appell's interests. Rob will also be teaching a workshop based on his pattern series, "Endangered Species," on Friday April 10. Through his main website (www.robappell.com) he has started a tutorial series called "Man Sewing" to promote his passion for sewing and creativity...yes, to not only men, but to all audiences.

The Morro Bay, California quilter blends a love for the ocean with his designs and writing. Some years ago, he began working in his mother's quilt shop, The Cotton

Ball, and discovered the appeal of Hawaiian shirt making. Shirt scraps then turned into quilts, with an emphasis on appliqué work. Appell brings a masculine touch to the tradition of quilt-making. In addition, his quilts are entirely machine made.



POTHOLDER NAME TAGS--Their Numbers Are Increasing!

Don't be left behind!! To commemorate our 25th year as a guild and to participate in a fun project, make a "potholder" name tag to display at our 2015 quilt show. This name tag wouldn't necessarily be worn as a name tag in the future (unless just for fun) but it will demonstrate our creativity AND will recall guild history. So far, the results have been wonderful—mermaids, ships, and quilt blocks of all sorts!



Make a quilted (three layers) 6" square potholder, bound, with a 1" hanging loop on one corner. The color and design are your choice, but a quilted mermaid--or the hint of one--is encouraged. Use any technique (applique, pieced, painted, embellished, etc). (No sharp objects in your design, please!) Front side must include the following (plus other elements if you choose):

*The name of our guild (Either "OCQG" or spelled out, "Oregon Coastal Quilt Guild")

*Your own name (Either full name or just your first name)

Please put your full name (first and last) on the back and date it for memory's sake. You can turn your potholder name tag in at any time, but the final deadline will be the June meeting, 2015.

DOCUMENTATION

The guild committee has been documenting Lincoln County quilts since January of 2000. Since then we have documented 1,431 quilts. By documenting, we have preserved each quilt's written and visual history. The records are held at the Log Cabin Research Library of the Lincoln County Historical Society. Quilt owners receive a copy of the documentation and a label to add to their quilt. Eventually, these records will be added to The Quilt Index, joining over 63,000 other quilts from other documentation projects, museums, and private collections in an on-line database available for anyone interested in quilts (www.quiltindex.org).

March 16th and 17th, I traveled to Moro in Sherman County with the Oregon Quilt Project. We were invited to train a new group at the Sherman County Museum. We documented museum quilts with a very enthusiastic team. They plan to continue with museum quilts and then other Sherman County quilts. Our next documentation session will be Saturday, April 18 at the Carriage House in Newport. If you have a quilt, quilt top, tied quilt or other quilted items, call to schedule an appointment. All quilts are welcome, old or new.



MINUTES OF THE MARCH 19, 2015 EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING OF THE OCQG

CALL TO ORDER

President Cindy McEntee called the meeting to order at 10:05 a.m. A quorum was present. Twenty-two members were in attendance. Minutes from the February Executive Board meeting were accepted with the following corrections:

Correction #1: The next quilt documentation day will be April 18 (NOT the first Saturday of the month).

Correction #2: There were no "Retreat profits". A cutting machine was raffled off, and those proceeds were used to purchase the Martelli cutting mat.

The Treasurer pointed out that the report shows a "carry over". There are no profits in the guild's treasury. The report is up-to-date as of the night before the Board meeting. The Treasurer's report was accepted.

OLD BUSINESS

OCQG has received a letter from Mary Bywater Cross of the Oregon Quilt Project (OQP), requesting a grant of \$500. The OQP, a non-profit organization, is dedicated to documenting, collecting, and preserving information about the quilts and quilt makers of (continued on next page)

Oregon, past and present. Velma Freudenthal, who recently participated in an OQP training session, gave a description of what the grant would accomplish, and she has the schedule for upcoming documentation days. For more info: www.oregonquiltproject.org. Discussion took place about the difference between guild Donations and Outreach Funding. Donations are set at the time the budget is established. We are able to do Outreach Funding at the end of the year, using what we have left over.

So far, Outreach Funding possibilities are: Coffee Creek Correctional Facility quilting program; the Oregon Quilt Project; Latimer Quilt and Textile Museum; the "Tuesday Stitchers" at the Kiwanda Community Center; and our local groups of the guild: Leta's Legacy, Knotty Ladies, Bayshore Quilters, Lincoln County Quilters, and Lighthouse Quilters. It was urged that local groups get Outreach Funding first. Decisions will be made in May; checks will be written in June.

NEW BUSINESS

Newsletter - It's apparent there needs to be a Newsletter Committee. Producing the Newsletter is too huge a job for one person. Judy McCoy has stepped to the plate for part of it. Nan Scott suggested the following for an equitable sharing of responsibilities: we need two photographers; at least one, more likely two, reporters; a distribution clerk, and an editor. Other suggestions were: writing articles of special interest; little "cameos" or feature articles on members; a "new member" feature; Becky Mershon offered to record names during Show and Share. Nan will submit a request to the general membership for volunteers. It was moved, seconded, and accepted that a Newsletter Committee be established. It was also moved, seconded, and accepted that a new publishing program be purchased for Judy McCoy's use.

<u>Audit Committee</u> - Fran Whited presented the audit results for the fiscal year 2013-2014. The audit was performed by Fran and Mary Gilliland. Treasurer Pat Laub was commended for her record keeping, organization, and neatness, which made it easy to follow the workings of the guild's finances. It was moved, seconded, and the audit accepted.

Advertising - The raffle quilt was at Jane's Fabric Patch last month; Bolts and Blocks this month. Bolts and Blocks also put a picture of the quilt on its Facebook page.

<u>Block of the Month</u> - Lorne Pleger brought the sign up sheet for the next BOM. He reported that when the "Frozen" series of blocks are over, "Seven Dwarfs" will be the next theme. Because block winners would like to have one of each of the series, Lorne recommended they make the trade after the meeting.

<u>2015 Challenge</u> - Twenty-one members have signed up for this year's Challenge. These are due at the June meeting, but Jane Szabo would like them a little before. There will be an announcement at the general meeting so participants will know the exact deadline. <u>Community Service</u> - Ann Flescher has joined the committee. Norma Horn reported 28 dog beds were delivered after the meeting. The Committee is in need of larger quilts for donation. They are still doing pillows for the hospital gift shop.

<u>Documentation</u> - The next documentation is April 18 at the Carriage House. After that, it will be June 20 at the Lincoln County Historic Museum.

Hospitality - Clarified that there is only one potluck per year, in December. There will be no potluck in May.

<u>Finishing School</u> - Karen Donobedian reported that Karen Oetjen is doing very well after her recent surgery. Finishing School is on the 4th Thursday (this month it's March 26) from 10:00 a.m to 4:00 p.m. Karen Donobedian will do a demonstration on binding. <u>Membership</u> - Nan Scott reported 199 members. Barb Martin goes into surgery later this month. Keep her in your thoughts.

Committee Reconfiguration - Finance and Raffle will separate; Finance/Budget will combine into Audit/Budget.

Newsletter - Deadline for input is midnight Sunday, March 22.

<u>Program/Workshops</u> - We hope to see blocks from the March Workshop, "Use Up Those Ugly Fabrics". Rob Appel's workshop will be in April, and we need more participants. He has specific fabrics, and there is a lot to do ahead of time. Helene Knott comes in May to teach "Totem Animals" (the largest piece you'll need is a fat quarter). Nicole Gunson's "Hope's Diamond" workshop is scheduled for June. Ginger Dale will send a list of programs to Nan as soon as the general meeting is over.

<u>Publicity</u> - Jean Amundson had last year's list of special ribbons that members purchased and gave to quilts in the show. We'll do this again this year--think of how you would like to recognize a quilt that fits your idea (example: an "Ooh-la-la" ribbon).

Quilt Show - The Quilt Show Committee was scheduled to meet today at 1:15 p.m.

Merchandising - Susan Cronenwett brought a variety of merchandise, highlighting our Lighthouse logo and the previous Ship logo, for possible sale to the membership and at the quilt show. Among the items were a small tote bag; a variety of shirts; fleece vest, fleece jacket, and light and dark denim shirts. The clothing would be pre-ordered with your size. Extra items (the most popular items ordered by the guild) would be sold in the boutique. Embroidery would be done locally. The majority of the Board favored shirts with the guild's logo, and it was suggested long-sleeve polo shirts be added to the array.

Susan also suggested notecards to be sold individually. She showed the fabric panel with both the Lighthouse and Ship logos. It was suggested the Lighthouse panel be 22" across as a standard size for a quilt pattern. She'll also make two smaller sizes. 2015 Raffle Quilt - The quilt is currently at Bolts and Blocks in Albany. There is also a sign-up sheet to indicate interest in purchasing the pattern for this quilt, when available; also a schedule for where the quilt goes next. Every time Janet Sylvester moves it, she puts it on her Facebook page and also the guild's page.

2016 Raffle Quilt - This committee will be meeting April 22.

<u>2016 Retreat</u> - Next year's Retreat will be the same time, the last week in January 2016, Sunday through Wednesday, 24-27. The price is increasing slightly for the Chef's Choice meals. Sign-up has not yet opened.

Raffle Tickets - Ticket sales for the Raffle Quilt, to date, amount to \$1,445.00.

The meeting adjourned at 12:00 noon.

Minutes of the March 12, 2015 OCQG General Membership Meeting

The meeting was called to order by President Cindy McEntee at 1:00 P.M.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

A half hour was set aside during this meeting for the silent auction of members' stuff they wanted to get rid of, and this was the first year members could purchase at a set price (Buy it Now), or bid it up.

Business cards, with only general information about the guild (no member names), were available for members' use.

The guild received a poster for a 41st NW Quilt Show at the Expo Center in Portland, May 1 & 2. It's not known how this show relates to the annual show in August.

The guild received a thank-you card from Carol and LaRayne for asking them to share with us a part of Latimer Quilt & Textile Center. Last month they presented our Program, "Gather Around the Frame."

OCQG has celebrities in its midst! Three of our members had their quilts accepted into this year's American Quilters Society quilt show in Paducah, KY: Susan Cronenwett; Karen Donobedian; and Ruth Hutmacher. They were kind enough to bring in their quilts to show us.

Gail Chipman announced she had a friend who was trying to sell his mother's collection of nearly 500 thimbles, and she showed pictures of that collection. If you are interested in the whole collection, or some of them, contact Gail and she'll put you in contact with her friend.

Nan Scott announced a "free shipping" deal for the SewEzi Sewing Table. These portable sewing tables sell for \$249. One sewing machine insert for the table comes with that price. Extra inserts are at additional cost. Ten people had to sign up during the meeting, and they did, so the free shipping threshold was met. The code is NS330. If you are interested in buying, you must place your own order on line by March 30, 2015, using that code.

Sonny Hamner is still looking for Quilts of Valor blocks. Some packets were picked up some months ago and not turned back in as sewn blocks.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership - Seventy-nine members, one new member, and two guests were present.

2015 Challenge Quilts - In Jane Szabo's absence, Heidi Ware & Ginger Dale showed a small sample quilt Jane had done to give members some inspiration for the challenge. This year's challenge, a 25" square quilt (2015 is the 25th anniversary of OCQG) depicting a scene looking at the coast from a boat. A 3" wide strip of silver fabric is given to participants to use as Hwy. 101 in their designs. Please include in your design three different nature-related elements, such as seashells, sea gulls, driftwood, etc. Community Service - Jackie Stankey made a plea for much needed personal items and toiletries for the South Towne Resource Center or Food Share. GLUTEN-FREE PEANUT BUTTER MONSTER COOKIES (From Marge Hoyt)

6 eggs

1 pound brown sugar

1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla

2 cups granulated sugar

4 teaspoons baking soda

1/2 pound butter

1 1/2 pounds peanut butter (either style)

9 cups gluten free oatmeal (regular oats contain gluten)

1/2 pound chocolate chips

1/2 pound M and M's1/2 cup chopped nuts

You can add raisins or craisins.
