MAY PROGRAM—Helene Knott will be presenting "A Dedicated Fabric Lover's Trunk Show." Helene Knott is a Portland designer, quilter, and teacher who has won national awards. You won't want to miss this.


MAY WORKSHOP—On Friday, May 15 Helene Knott will be teaching Animal Totems, a lovely



blending of reverse applique and either Seminole or Foundation Piecing. There are several animal patterns to choose from – a Salmon, Bear, Wolf, Jaguar, Seal, Bird, Deer, Horse, Turtle and more. This is a great project for beginners as well as more accomplished quilters. These quilts are beautiful as is but also provide fertile ground for those who enjoy embroidery and embellishment and some of the inset panels can be a good way to use up scraps. Cost of the workshop is \$40 and \$5 for the pattern. There are still a few openings, so if you are interested call Jackie Stankey to sign up.

JUNE PROGRAM—Our June program and workshop is with Nicole Gunson of Pieceful Expressions in Bend. At the Thursday, June 11 Guild meeting, Nicole will be sharing her story and quilts designed by her and her brother Eric.

JUNE WORKSHOP—On Friday, June 12 Nicole will be teaching two different curved ruler techniques. One is the Leaves Galore Ruler which is used to make the Hope's Diamond Quilt and many other quilts designed by Sue Pelland. The other is the Quick Curve Ruler which is used to make several quilt designs from sewkindofwonderful.com. We have the Hope's Diamond Patterns available now for sale at \$6 and we can order more. ➤ Quilt Registration is Now Open!

Now through July 5th you can register your quilt for the 25th Annual Quilts by the Sea. Go to www.oregoncoastalquilters.org and select Quilt Show in the left navigation bar. Then select "Quilt Show Registration" at the top of the page to enter your quilt.

A picture must be submitted with your entry either as an email attachment mailed to Shari Stewart or give to the registrars at the guild meetings. On-line registration is fast and easy, but if you would like help with the process, you may bring your quilts to the Bayshore Club House in Waldport every Friday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. (thru July 3) or prior to the next two

Guild Meetings: May 14 (day meeting) and June 11 (evening meeting). No appointment is necessary, just come with your entries and information. You will receive a confirming receipt for each entry that will contain your quilt/entry registration number.

Quilt Show Categories

This year the categories are determined by the intended use of the item rather than size. If the number in a category is large enough, entries may be further sub-divided by size. All you have to do is determine how your item will be used.

- For the Bed (all sizes of beds from crib to king)
- 2) For the Wall (art quilts or from a pattern to be hung on the wall)
- 3) **Throws or Lap Quilts** (all sizes to be used for snuggling on the couch or at a game)
- 4) **Miscellaneous** (table runners, place mats, pillows, knick knacks)
- 5) **Wearables** (jackets, vests, bags, hats)

This month we profile members of the Quilt Show Committee so that members can get to know them better as individuals and their vital functions in putting on the quilt show—which may arguably be the Guild's premier and signature activity. We could not reach all members of the Quilt Show Committee for this issue of the newsletter, so will continue the profiles in future issues.

Susan Cronenwett is Co-Chair of the Quilt Show Committee. Susan learned that putting on the quilt show "takes a lot of work which you don't realize until you are in the thick of it." But, adds Susan, "I love working with the committee members and learning everything I can from them." Together, the quilt show committee is working to promote "continued sharing of our talent and beautiful quilts to the community and each other." Susan is product branding and packaging designer for her company, Artico, and has lived on the Coast for 9 years. She loves all quilt techniques and styles, but if she had to pick, she would say she likes art quilts with appliqué in all techniques. "I am currently working on a large art quilt entitled 'Ode to Picasso." The quilt she finished before was a children's quilt for which she designed the pattern and will be creating kits for sale at the show. Susan's partner, Lois, lives in Eugene and works in Salem which means they only get to see each other on weekends; Lois too is also a quilter. Susan has 4 children from Guatemala who she helped raise and who currently live in the San Francisco Bay Area. She has 4 grandchildren, all under the age of 5.

Tess Burr is a second Co-Chair of the Quilt Show Committee. This single lady works part-time at the Loofah Soap and Creations shop on the Bayfront. She is a former teacher and has been living on the coast for two years. She is also vice-president of a local PEO chapter. She likes all quilting styles and techniques and is currently working on wallhangings from a Jane Sassaman class she took in Arizona and a Rob Appell class she took here. Her goals as the Quilt Show Committee Co-chair are to "spread joy and have fun."

Marylynn Kleemann is a retired school nurse administrator and has been living on the coast for 15 years (plus 10 years as a summer resident). Her current Quilt Show responsibilities are to be the Quilt Show South Depot and to Cochair for the Judging. Her hope is to continue to improve the judging experience for members. Like many of us, Marylynn likes both hand appliqué and piecing—particularly art/picture quilts, but says she struggles with the machine quilting. Jackie Stankey is in charge of the Quilt Show Demonstrations which include demonstrations by vendors of special techniques/products. She is also responsible for the bed turning by the Latimer Center of antique quilts. Jackie, a retired hospice RN, is currently finishing two quilts for the show: (1) Blue/green ocean quilt with 5 Shashiko embroidered blocks of ocean creatures and (2) a queen-sized white/black Dresden plate done in the modern style with touches of color added.

Velma Freudenthal is the co-chair in charge of Registration for the Quilt Show. A true "Coastie," she has lived here for nearly 40 years. She and Shari are available to help with the registering process for the quilts and to take pictures of them. Both are willing to take photos before Quilt Guild meetings and are already scheduled to appear with the Knotty Ladies, Lincoln City Quilters, and Bayshore. Busy as she is, she recently finished a Judy Niemeyer Prairie Star quilt started in a Guild class.

Rose Shaw is in charge of Outdoor Signs and Vendors. "Signage is extremely important. We have the signs but need help in putting them up on the day of the show." For vendors, "we mark each vendor's space, then greet and help vendors get their goods on the show floor. We also relieve them during the show and help them take down their displays." Rose is a retired office manager for a pioneer cemetery and has been living on the Coast for 15 years. Her favorite quilting technique is freezer paper appliqué. She's now working on an appliquéd quilt with roses and rosebuds and has just finished an "Ugly Fabric" quilt. She has a husband, 2 daughters and a son, and 5 grandchildren.

Judy Line is on the Quilt Show Committee to oversee the Boutique, which she hopes will be stuffed with items from Guild Members hoping to sell their wares. A widow, Judy has 5 daughters and one son and is the lucky grandmother to 18 grandchildren. As busy as she is, she still has time to work on a "Crabapple Tree," Christmas Quilt titled "The Night Before Christmas," that she is expanding to bed-size and her last completed quilt was a half-square triangle using vintage fabrics.

Jane Szabo, last year's Guild President, is heading up the Advertising and Hanging Committees. She is the one responsible for creating a pleasing order of quilts for the Show and for inviting the community to come see what the Guild has done. She's been married for 42 years to her college sweetheart, Jim, and together they have 3 children and 8 grandchildren living in 3 countries: The United States, Canada, and Australia. She's working on her Mariner's Compass quilt to finish for the Show. Jane is a retired Home Economics teacher.

Pat Laub_is Co-chair of the Judging Committee and has as her goal to "have a successful judging experience for all." She'd like to remind Guild members that the quilts need to arrive on the Monday before the Quilt Show when they will be sorted into their separate categories; then, on Tuesday and Wednesday, the quilts will be judged. This year our judge is Helen Frost. Finally, the quilts will be transported to the Rec Center and hung on Thursday. She is also working on her Mariner's Compass quilt.

Jean Amundson has several responsibilities as she is in charge of Newspaper publicity, the Sponsored Ribbons, and the Potholder Name Tags. She'd *really* like each member to make a potholder nametag for the display at the show! The deadline for the Sponsored Ribbons is at the July General Meeting and the Potholder Nametags need to be delivered at the June meeting. Jean loves everything about quilting: hand/machine, traditional/non-traditional work. She says, "I even enjoy doing bindings, labels, etc." After living 40 years in the desert near Death Valley, Jean, a retired administrative officer/contract negotiator, is *glad* to have been living on the coast for 12 years.

Membership Connections

We have been printing birthdays for the current month in the newsletter, but in order to save space, we have discontinued that practice. Birthdays are printed by month in the back of the directory. 
there was no shortage of conversation when the four met for lunch at Georgies.

MINUTES OF THE APRIL 9, 2015 OCQG GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING

The meeting was called to order by President Cindy McEntee at 6:38 p.m.

The agenda was changed from the printed version handed out at the meeting to accommodate an expected longer program for the evening.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Jean Amundson is accepting potholder nametags. The hope is all members will make one for themselves, and they will all be displayed at the quilt show in August.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership - Gaylynn Roth reported 74 members and 5 guests in attendance.

<u>Documentation</u> - Velma Freudenthal announced the next documentation session for Saturday, April 18, at the Carriage House. Lincoln City is on the schedule for Saturday, June 20.

<u>Finishing School</u> - Paulette Stenberg urged members to change their UFOs into FFOs (Finally Finished Objects!) at Finishing School, which happens on the 4th Thursday of each month (except November & December), 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the Carriage House. Bring your lunch and get a lot of sewing done, either by hand or by machine! <u>Retreat</u> - Sign-up for the 2016 OCQG Retreat opens next month. Nan Scott reported the dates will be January 24-27, 2016. The cost for food is going up slightly, but most of the increase will be offset by an overage left from the last Retreat.

<u>Merchandising</u> - Susan Cronenwett will have a table set up next month an hour before the meeting starts for members to try on clothing to be ordered before the quilt show. The clothing will have embroidered OCQG logos, and members can try on for size, choose color, and pre-order.

Quilt Show - Pat Laub advised members about changes made to the categories for quilt show judging. There will be a Best of Show for Hand Applique and also a Best of Show for Hand Quilting. Be sure to answer all questions when submitting your quilt for judging so the judge has all information to make an informed decision. Shari Stewart and Velma Freudenthal offered their help in getting your quilts registered for the show. Registration is online now, and there are two ways to get there on the guild website. Velma and Shari stressed that they are here to help; give them a call if you need any assistance at all.

<u>Programs and Workshops</u> - Ginger Dale reported the following upcoming events: Don't forget the 2015 Challenge, viewing the Oregon coast from a boat. Get these 25" square challenge quilts finished before the meeting in June for voting. Helene Knott will be presenting her Animal Mola workshop in May; in June, Nicole Gunson will teach how to use the quick curve ruler to make "Hope's Diamond."

DRAWINGS AND PRIZES

<u>Quilter's Surprise/Nifty Notions</u> - Congratulations to winners Lana Pries, Judy Guettler, and Benita Goodheart. <u>SABLE</u> - Three winners: Lana Pries, Sheila Stevens, and Jean Amundson.

<u>Block-of-the-Month</u> - Cindy McEntee won the six "Elsa" blocks that were turned in. Lorne Pleger reported there were a couple of "catch-up" blocks turned in also. The next series for BOM will be the Seven Dwarfs; "Bashful" is the first of the series. One of the months will have two blocks to include "Snow White" in the series.

Show and Share - Wonderful quilts were shown that resulted from recent workshops; Susan Cronenwett's visiting niece, Eva, showed her second quilt, which was simply amazing; a beautiful Quilt of Valor by Sonny Hamner; Kathleen Ritzman's "orange period" quilt (similar to Picasso's blue period); a donation to the small quilt auction by Delores Thompson; Jeanne Butler's delightful scrappy quilt--a big thank you to **all** guild members who show their fabric works of art.

<u>Program</u> - Rob Appell presented his trunk show of quilts and described his journey from making Hawaiian shirts and repairing sewing machines in his mom's quilt shop to becoming a well-known quilter and instructor.

MINUTES OF APRIL 16, 2015 OCQG EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING

CALL TO ORDER

President Cindy McEntee called the meeting to order at 10:03 a.m. A quorum was present. Twenty-one members were in attendance

Minutes from the March Executive Board meeting were voted on and accepted. After discussion, it was decided that General Meeting Minutes will also be voted on at the following General Meeting, putting it on the agenda around the time the Membership report is presented.

Treasurer's Report. There was a question about whether a check has been received from the Umpqua Bank. There has not, and Treasurer Pat Laub will check on this when she makes her next deposit. By affirmative vote, the Treasurer's report was accepted. (continued on next page)

O.C.Q.G. Logo Merchandise - Susan Cronenwett brought clothing to the meeting for Board members to try on and make decisions on what style, size, and color for pre-order. An order form was also available for various sizes of the ship and lighthouse fabric panels and bundle packs. She plans on taking these items to Bay Shore tomorrow; after that she'll have these at her studio. Call ahead if you intend to shop at her place. Guild members will have the same opportunity at the next meeting, and Susan plans to have the orders right after that meeting. These items will also be sold at the Boutique during the quilt show. At the next General Meeting Susan will talk about whether to offer note cards as part of the pool of merchandise. The more cards printed, the less cost for printing. Posters will be printed on heavier paper this year, and only the lighthouse design will be printed as a poster. A big thank you to Susan for all the time and effort put into this promotion.

Outreach Funds - Discussion took place on how to provide \$500 of Outreach Funding to groups who foster the art of quilting. In the past, money was given to the facilities who allow quilt groups to meet in their rooms, but that money goes toward electricity or other utility expense, and that seems far removed from the intended purpose. It was decided that \$100 will go to the Latimer Quilt and Textile Center, and \$400 will go to the Oregon Quilt Project.

NEW BUSINESS

<u>Tag-on Workshop with Portland Guild</u> - Ginger Dale floated the idea of tagging on with the Portland guild for a workshop with Weeks Ringle in January 2017. She reported it would be an expensive workshop, focusing on modern quilts and color theory. The general consensus was that not many members would be interested in spending a lot for a workshop on color theory. Various ideas were recommended to gauge OCQG membership interest in workshops. Cindy McEntee said she would put something in her President's message and bring it up at the General Meeting. We'll continue to beat the drum.

<u>Storage</u> - As a "heads-up," Jane Szabo reported that the Guild may have to arrange for a new storage situation, and if so, a good time to make the transition would be at the time of the Quilt Show. Space needed: 1/2 of a double garage. We currently pay \$1,000 per year.

<u>Block of the Month</u> - Lorne Pleger brought the sign-up sheet for the next BOM for anyone who did not sign up at the General Meeting. "Seven Dwarfs" is the next theme; so far only eight or nine members signed up.

2015 Challenge - Jane Szabo reported twenty-one members have signed up for this year's Challenge, "viewing the coastline from a boat."

<u>Documentation</u> - The next documentation is Saturday, April 18, at the Carriage House. Velma Freudenthal recently helped document historic quilts at the Oregon Trail Museum in Oregon City.

<u>Finishing School</u> - Finishing School is on the 4th Thursday (this month it's April 23) from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Bring your lunch, meet and get to know your fellow guild members, and make significant progress on your quilts.

Hospitality - There will be no potluck in May.

Membership - Nan Scott reported 199 members.

<u>Newsletter</u> - Judy McCoy handed around a guideline that she uses in publishing the Newsletter which provided Board members with a good idea of layout, typeface, line spacing, etc. She is using a new publishing program that's made it easier to produce the Newsletter. Last month she featured Executive Board Members; this month she will feature committees and their seasoned members. Deadline for input is midnight Sunday, April 19.

<u>Program/Workshops</u> - There are still some openings for the next workshop, Helene Knott's "Animal Totems," and lots of openings for the curved ruler workshop in June with Nicole Gunson.

<u>Publicity</u> - Jean Amundson has prepared an article for the 2015 Raffle Quilt and will be preparing a profile on Ann Davis for the Quilt Show and an article on Helene Knott.

Quilt Show - Tesse Burr had flyers on the quilt show for members to distribute.

<u>2015 Raffle Quilt</u> - The quilt is at JanniLou's in Philomath until May 2, then on to Grandma's Attic in Dallas. So far, Janet reported ticket sales at \$2,000.
