


Geographical Distribution of Oregon Coastal Quilters Guild Membership in 2015

No appointment is necessary, just come with your entries and information.

Quilt Show Categories

This year the categories are determined by the intended use of the item rather than size. If the number in a category is large enough, entries may be further sub-divided by size. All you have to do is determine how your item will be used.

- 1) **For the Bed** (all sizes of beds from crib to king)
- 2) For the Wall (art quilts or from a pattern to be hung on the wall)
- 3) **Throws or Lap Quilts** (all sizes to be used for snuggling on the couch or at a game)
- Miscellaneous (table runners, place mats, pillows, knick knacks)
- 5) Wearables (jackets, vests, bags, hats)

MINUTES OF THE MAY 14, 2015 OCQG GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING

The meeting was called to order by President Cindy McEntee at 1:05 p.m.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Membership Approval of Minutes - The President announced that starting this month, minutes from the prior month's meeting will be voted on by the membership. Minutes are published in the guild's Fat Quarter newsletter. Lisa Taylor made the motion to approve; Liz Ritchie seconded; members voted to approve the minutes.

Outreach Funding - This is a little extra money donated over and above the regular yearly donations we make. Our Board recommended \$400 go to the Oregon Quilt Project and \$100 go to the Latimer Quilt and Textile Center. Joan Johnson made the motion to approve; Karen Oetjen seconded; members voted to approve this funding.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership - Shirley Gilmore reported 4 new members and 6 guests, with a total of 93 members in attendance.

2015 Challenge - Jane Szabo asked that those making this year's Challenge bring them to the meeting next month early so they can be hung for viewing--members in attendance will vote on them during the break.

Merchandising - Clothing and lighthouse and ship panels were displayed an hour before the meeting for members to try on clothing and fill out their orders, as well as order from the catalog. The orders will go in on June 1, with merchandise here in July.

Quilt Show - Posters to advertise the quilt show were available to place in windows of businesses. Tesse Burr has small postcards and cards. Contact her if you need more. Shari Stewart and Velma Freudenthal are registrars for your guilts, and Shari said they are available at the Bay Shore Club House on Friday. If you need any help at all, just give them a call. She announced 20 quilts have been registered so far; we need about 200 more! Jean Amundson would like members to sponsor a ribbon (these are above and beyond the judge's ribbons). Right now there are 20, but she said we can accommodate around 32. You can choose the topic, and you choose the quilt. Karen Donobedian asked that people who are working on the quilt show make themselves available at the break to get their photo taken for the newsletter. And, last but not least, don't forget to make your potholder name tags!

Programs and Workshops - Jackie Stankey reported that Helene Knott's class, Animal Totems, Friday, May 15, was full. One participant had to cancel at the last minute, so that left one opening.

Program - Helene Knott gave a detailed explanation of the different kinds of fabric and types of dyeing that is done to produce them. She showed and passed around beautiful examples of fabrics and her Japanese-inspired quilts and animal totems.

DRAWINGS AND PRIZES

Quilter's Surprise/Nifty Notions - Congratulations to Quilter's Surprise winners Karen Oetjen and Shari Stewart, and Nifty Notions winners Twy Hoch and Heidi Ware. Helene Knott also donated a bundle of fabrics won by Cyndie Wenz.

SABLE - Lots of fat quarters brought in this month produced four winners: Lisa Hall; Kathleen Holt; Gail Chipman; and Twy Hoch.

Block-of-the-Month - Ruth Hutmacher won the four "Kristoff" blocks that were turned in. Lorne Pleger reported five more should be coming in later. "Bashful" is next month's BOM, kicking off the first of the series, The Seven Dwarfs. The next one will be "Doc," with flesh material supplied. The next pieced block in the Block Rockin' series is "Morrison"--these blocks you get to keep.

Show and Share - Six projects were shown that resulted from last month's Rob Appell workshop, "Endangered Species"--Becky Mershon had hers finished! Jackie Stankey showed two large quilts, one a beauty with a white background which her cat, of course, loved to sleep on; Rosalie Raudsep showed a quilt top ("Mikey's Monkey Quilt") for a youngster named Michael Miller, and while working on it, found out the fabric designer is Michael Miller! Dolores Thomas donated another small silent auction quilt, an embroidered gem with a Christmas theme. Sue Stephenson showed a brights-on-black Mariner's Compass quilt from a class she took at Ouilters Cottage when it was still in Toledo. Doni Boyd showed a "stacked blocks" quilt she planned to donate to Quilts of Valor. She only purchased one ticket, but Ann Best won a Double Irish Chain done with florals, a River City Opportunity Quilt, which she brought to share with us. Another "Use up Your Ugly Fabric" top was shown by Rose Shaw. Judy McCoy showed two quilts done for a baby coming in August, one of them her first "twister" quilt. Tina McCann showed a handpieced and hand-quilted art quilt. Norma Horn used up 2,938 squares salvaged from scraps for dog beds to sew up a great quilt she donated to Community Quilts. What a treasure trove of talent this OCOG is!

MINUTES OF THE MAY 21, 2015 OCQG EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING

President Cindy McEntee called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. Nineteen members were in attendance, and a quorum was present. One correction to the April Executive Board meeting minutes was made: Velma Freudenthal had recently helped document historic quilts at the Museum of the Oregon Territory, NOT the Oregon Trail Museum. Rose Shaw made the motion to accept the minutes; Nan Scott seconded; the minutes were voted on and accepted.

OLD BUSINESS

2015 Round Robin - The 2015 Round Robin border exchanges will conclude at the June meeting when the tops will be revealed and given to their owners. Nancy Terhaar reported the Round Robin had gone very well and asked that this part of the general membership meeting be allotted some extra time on the agenda. The revealing will happen before the break in keeping with Committee announcements. The tops have been kept secret, and this will be the first time since February that the quilters who made the center blocks will see their quilt tops. Also, general membership will be interested in seeing how these quilts have developed. After discussion, it was decided Nancy will have the stack of quilts on a table up front. The eleven participants will come up front, and one at a time, their quilt tops will be shown. The owner can say a little bit about their center block if they wish, and then Nancy will ask those who worked on the top to raise their hands. The quilt tops will then be laid on the tables where Show-n-Share quilts are held, so that the membership at large can view them during the break.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

<u>Quilt Show</u> - Members will be able to sign up at the next meeting to help with all the activities that go on during the Quilt Show; Lighthouse posters will be for sale; Registrars will be there early to register quilts for the Show. The Quilt Show Committee had a meeting scheduled for this afternoon.

Jean Amundson reported that members can buy tickets at the June meeting for a raffle quilt, proceeds going to the Samaritan House. The 2015 Challenge Quilts will also be hung before the meeting and voted upon during break. Cindy asked that Committee Chairs send her information on what they plan to report or do at the June meeting. She also decided to start the meeting at 6:00 p.m, Table Walk at 5:30, so that everything scheduled for this meeting can have sufficient time.

This would be the first time they would be shown. Ginger Dale offered to check into this.

<u>Block of the Month</u> - Lorne Pleger brought a couple of extra "Bashful" patterns from the Seven Dwarf series. He also handed out a small flyer for the Seal Rock Garden Club Plant and Flower Show scheduled for June 20.

2015 Raffle Quilt - Ticket sales are going well, and the quilt will be going to Family Fabrics next to be on display during the Beachcombers Celebration. In July, it will be at the Maritime Museum. Members must turn in all ticket stubs and money by the July meeting.

<u>Community Service</u> - Norma Horn reported they had 80 quilts in stock, with 22 handed in recently. The Committee needs twin size and larger.

<u>Documentation</u> - Velma Freudenthal reported on upcoming Oregon Quilt Project documentation: Saturday, May 30, at the Washington County Museum in Hillsboro and Saturday, June 20, at the Lincoln County Museum.

<u>Finishing School</u> - Finishing School is on the 4th Thursday (this month it's May 28) from 10:00 a.m to 4:00 p.m. Bring your lunch, work on your quilts, and get some good advice if you need it.

<u>Membership</u> - Nan Scott reported four new members, and one long-distance member who rejoined by mail, for a total of 204 members. Tesse Burr had smaller posters and flyers for members to hand out for advertising.

<u>Newsletter</u> - The deadline for getting information into the newsletter is Sunday, May 24--please honor the deadline, and members, please contribute articles for the *Fat Quarter News*.

<u>Program/Workshops</u> - There are still some openings for the "Hope's Diamond" and curved ruler workshop in June with Nicole Gunson. Nicole will present her trunk show at the June meeting. The next workshop after that will be "Carpenter's Square" with Lawry Thorn in September. The Helene Knott "Animal Totem" workshop was very well received. Ginger Dale asked that you let her know about any Table Walk special needs or space for the June meeting.

<u>Publicity</u> - Jean Amundson has interviewed Ann Davis about the early days of the guild. She reported that the Atonement Church was having a fund raiser to benefit Samaritan House: Supper and a movie, "My Man Godfrey." Jean was complimented on the excellent article about Helene Knott.

<u>2016 Raffle Quilt</u> - This committee will meet next on June 2. The group is making up packets for people to take and sew up for the sky and water. Water packets will be handed out at the June meeting.

<u>2016 Řetreat</u> - Nan Scott reported that only 6 spaces are left after only one sign-up session at the May meeting. She will have waiting lists, however. Before the September meeting, you need to pay a non-refundable deposit of \$50 to stay signed up. <u>SABLE</u> - Next month's fabric theme is "water."

Storage - Jane Szabo reminded the Board that the Guild may have to arrange for a new storage situation. Space needed: roughly 15' x 25' would be the minimum. Where: Newport/South Beach. It doesn't need to be heated but definitely water tight. Old Treadle Machine Bases - Rose Shaw reported that Janome is asking for old treadle sewing machine bases which they use to reconfigure with new sewing machines that are sent to Haiti to teach Haitians to sew to earn money. <u>Fat Quarters for Auction Baskets</u> - Betty Jones said they have the baskets they need but only about a third of the fat quarters needed to fill them. Members are encouraged to donate two fat quarters to make these fantastic auction items at the Quilt Show. The meeting adjourned at 11:17 a.m.


