NEXT MEETING TOPIC: "AFTER THE SANDWICH"



At our October meeting, we will have the pleasure of hearing from Jean Amundson, past president of our Guild. Jean modestly insists she still has a lot to learn and therefore we can say "pretty good quilter" instead of other superlatives in describing her. We have all seen and admired Jean's wonderful quilts, and at our meeting she will share with us tips and techniques for adding the finishing touches to a quilt that will enhance our best efforts at piecing and quilting. This is a topic not often covered in quilting books and we are privileged to have someone so accomplished share her knowledge with us.

NOT TOO LATE TO TAKE OCTOBER WORKSHOP: "FINALLY....A JACKET THAT FITS!"



Our fellow Guild member, and life-long seamstress, Becky Mershon, will bring us a class on fitting and making a jacket that actually fits. Here is her description of the process: "In this one-day class we will start by taking 15 different body measurements and use those to adjust each piece of your paper pattern. Marking and stabilizing the main body pieces in your fabric will be discussed before you begin cutting into the fashion fabric. We plan to do two fittings for the jacket — basic body shell and then shell with sleeves and collar. Your jacket will not be finished by the end of class but you will be

well on your way and have a paper pattern that fits and can be reused many times." This is your chance to learn this skill with plenty of one-on-one help. The class is Saturday, October

10th. You can sign up at the October meeting. The cost is \$23 for members and non-members. You will need a simple jacket pattern of your choosing, or the suggested McCall's/Vogue Pattern V8676 plus the required fabric. A list of additional needed supplies can be found on the Oregon Coastal Quilters Guild website under the Workshops heading.

been her full-time job.



The quilt measures 72" x 72" and is modern in nature but lends itself to hand quilting, custom machine quilting, and everything in-between. There is no applique and the skill level starts at Confident Beginner. If you can sew a half square triangle



Minutes of the September 10, 2015 OCQG General Membership Meeting

The meeting was called to order by President Cindy McEntee at 1:00 p.m.

ANNOUNČEMENTS

Lisa Taylor made a motion to accept the August General Membership Meeting minutes. Toni Brodie seconded the motion; members voted to accept.

Rosalie Raudsep is very ill and currently at Regency Rehabilitation in Florence. Cards and visits would be greatly appreciated. Lynda Shephard, who taught a workshop on miniatures for the guild a number of years ago, has been inducted into the Arizona Quilters Hall of Fame. She is a friend of Rose Shaw's. Helen Frost Young, our quilt judge for the last two years, is also in the Arizona Quilters Hall of Fame.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership—Gaylynn Roth reported a total of 86 members and 6 guests present at the meeting.

Small Quilt Auction Proceeds Presented—Betty Jones presented a check for \$532 to Christine Uhl, representative for the Lincoln County Children's Advocacy Center. This amount represents half of what the small quilt auction brought in at the quilt show. Twenty-six small quilts were donated by members; the "Buy-it-Now" option proved to be popular and will be part of the auction again next year. Betty encouraged more members to make small quilts for the auction. This year's small quilt auction brought in the most money to date! Charitable organizations are so appreciative of our guild's generosity.

Quilt Documentation—Velma Freudenthal reported there are several spots still open for the next Guild Documentation Day, September 19. Our last Documentation Day for 2015 will be October 17.

Important Committee Information—(1) Committee Chairs need to submit budget requests for 2016 to Janet Sylvester. (2) The Community Quilts Committee needs a new Chairperson. (3) Sue Stephenson will be the 2016 Quilt Show Chair, with Pat Laub assisting. Tesse Burr also volunteered to help. (4) Our President urged members to volunteer for committees--there is no better way to meet people, have fun, give back to the guild that gives you so much pleasure!

Mini-Retreat—Jennifer Reinhart announced sign-up sheets and Judy Niemeyer patterns were available for the mini-retreat with Janni-Lou Creations at Gleneden Beach, October 1-3. Cost is \$120. A couple of spots are left. You do not have to stay

overnight; lunch will be provided during the three days of retreat. You can do a smaller pattern to get started.

Jennifer's Community Quilt Coupon—Jennifer wants guild members to know she is still quilting for people and offers a Community Quilt Coupon incentive. For every one of your quilts you have quilted, you'll get a coupon to use for quilting a community quilt—the finished quilt must be donated to the OCQG Community Quilt Program.

OCQG Mystery Quilt—Jennifer has organized a mystery quilt project for interested guild members! The cost is \$10 for the clues (pattern); you use your own stash to make the quilt. Beginning in October, Jennifer will provide a pattern for a block; the choice of fabrics is yours. This is a stash buster quilt. Each month, there will be prizes for bringing in your completed block. The program ends next April; the quilts will be shown in June. If you are out of town, Jennifer will send you the next clue the evening of the meeting you missed.

Programs and Workshops—Ginger Dale reported "Carpenter's Square" would be taught by Lawry Thorn the next day, September 11. October's workshop will be "A Jacket that Actually Fits" by Becky Mershon. November brings Susan Cronenwett's workshop, "Modern Improvisation." There were samples of Susan's modern quilts at the meeting.

Guild Merchandise—Susan Cronenwett announced the guild logo merchandise would be here for only one more meeting. Some people bought merchandise and didn't pick it up. She'll be placing one more order of merchandisé, so if you missed something you want, let her know.

PROGRĂM

Lawry Thorn presented a wonderful trunk show of the many quilts she has made and taught through the Stitchin' Post in Sisters, Oregon. She started out there part-time, and now is office manager, bookkeeper, and does payroll. She teaches beginning quilting at Quilters' Affair, and some of her lovely quilts were mystery quilts she's taught over the years. Lawry was so kind to offer one of her patterns, "Turn & Tumble," free to members who attended the meeting. She also donated a number of Quilters' Affair tote bags for the Nifty Notions and Quilter's Surprise drawings.

DRAWINGŠ AND PRIZES

Quilter's Surprise/Nifty Notions—Winners of the Quilter's Surprise were Joanne Simpson and Sandie Lane; Nifty Notions, Heidi Ware and Anne Hendrickson.

SABLE—Enough fat quarters were brought in for two drawings, and winners were Lana Pries and Twy Hoch.

Block-of-the-Month—Lorne Pleger reported no blocks had been turned in. Next is #6 in the Seven Dwarfs series handed out to those interested in participating. Number 11 of the Block Rockin' series is "Global Concept."

Show and Share—Florence Roberts shared a quilt, ninth in a series being made, one for each grandchild--what a great grandma! Lisa Taylor showed two--one was a dish towel her friend, a musician, got as a gift with the music to "Let Me Call You grandma! Lisa turned it into a quilted wallhanging. She also got back a 1991 quilt she made and hand quilted for her parents (she's going to add more quilting). Marge Hoyt showed a king size, 116" x 116" "Stars and Stripes" and a quilt called "Cabin in the Woods." Jan Goebel, from Tumwater, WA, informed us about her other guild's quilt show in Olympia, October 8 & 9. She showed her 10" x 40" wallhanging depicting the four seasons, a challenge from her other guild. As any good quilter would do, she had to add a 3-D fabric piece of pie to get to 40". Next March, Jan will hold an OCQG workshop to make a fabric bag, small, medium, or large. Jean Amundson showed her salmon animal totem from Helene Knott's workshop. She added bling, calls is "Salmon on Ice," and gave it to her husband for their 54th anniversary. She also showed a miniature red and white paper-pieced quilt that will be taught in a class at Quilters Cottage. And, then there was Paulette Stepherg, who made our heads spin. She showed two quilts made from 2" squares and one from a jelly roll. Twy Hoch gave her Stenberg, who made our heads spin. She showed two quilts made from 2" squares and one from a jelly roll. Twy Hoch gave her some butterfly fabric backing for these, and some of that ended up on the front of one also. These were intended for Community Quilts. She showed a little quilt, "Good Morning, and Let the Stress Begin." Also a Quilt of Valor, also a raffle quilt for Fish of Lebanon hand quilted by the Bay Shore quilters. And finally a Christmas quilt for family members who always say "no gifts" but violate that rule. This quilt will make up for that. Go, Paulette!

Minutes of the September 17, 2015 OCQG Executive Board Meeting

CALL TO ORDER

President Cindy McEntee called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. A quorum was present. Eighteen members were in attendance

Judy McCoy pointed out changes, mostly typographical, that were made to the August Executive Board minutes. Jean Amundson made a motion to approve the edited minutes as they appeared in the Newsletter; Ginger Dale seconded. A vote was taken and the minutes accepted.

Treasurer's Report. Treasurer Pat Laub was unable to attend, but gave the President information beforehand on which to report. Merchandise sales brought in less than usual during the Quilt Show. Quilt show profit, to date, is \$4,260.51; however, this could change as there may be requests still outstanding. Expenses of less than \$100 were lumped under "other" on the Quilt Show income and expense report.

OLD BUSINESS

Storage—The guild must vacate its current storage location by November 30. Jean Amundson drafted a letter for the President's signature to U-Store Self Storage requesting a free or discounted storage unit based on the guild's nonprofit status. The board approved the letter, and Jean will forward it to Nan Scott to put on guild letterhead. We need to send it out immediately. A truck, or trucks, will be needed to make the move. President Cindy McEntee said the guild may be able to use the Mo's truck.

Change in By-Law—As required, Secretary Nancy Terhaar will add documentation to the Secretary Book regarding the approved change to Article III, Section 5, of the OCQG By-laws. She will provide this documentation to Parliamentarian Jane Szabo; the change will be published in the By-Laws section of the 2016 OCQG Directory.

NEW BUSINESS

Workshop Fees—Jean Amundson inquired about extra registration fees paid by non-members who wish to participate in OCQG workshops. This is not set in the By-laws. The increased fee has been at the discretion of the Workshop Committee. The cut-off for non-members to sign up is the guild meeting the month before the workshop. Ginger Dale will write up a proposal for discussion at the next meeting.

Oregon Coastal Quilters Mini Retreat—Jennifer Reinhart reported the mini retreat being spearheaded by JanniLou Creations has been very well received with fourteen members signed up. OCQG members have expressed an interest in having another mini retreat in the spring. The Programs/Workshop Committee will be scaling back on offering workshops every month, so maybe a mini retreat a couple of times per year at different locations, and with different focus, might be something to add to the mix for greater member participation. Jennifer suggested a big colorful poster with "Up-coming Attractions" be shown at guild meetings, once the year's programs/workshops are confirmed, especially highlighting nationally known teachers. The focus of this first mini retreat will be Judy Niemeyer patterns; President Cindy McEntee offered a "prep night" for cutting your fabric ahead of time at Mo's Annex on September 23 at 4:00 p.m.

Mystery Quilt Along—Jennifer Reinhart reported 48 people signed up for her Mystery Quilt Along. If you have signed up, the first clues will be handed out at the October meeting.

Budget—Budget input is due in September, and not every committee chair provided Janet Sylvester with a projected budget, so the Board went over Janet's budget page line-by-line to determine which items needed to be addressed. The budget is presented to the Board in October, discussion takes place, then the budget is presented to the General Membership meeting in November.

Day vs. Night Meetings—Nan Scott said she fields many calls about whether an upcoming meeting will be held during the day or at night. She proposed that daytime meetings take place October through March; April through September would be night meetings. She also proposed table walk begin at 5:30 p.m. for the night meetings which would end the meetings earlier (8:00 p.m.). The Board will make a recommendation next month.

2016 Challenge—Jeanie Singler (Benita Goodheart will co-chair) presented an idea for next year's guild Challenge. The idea is for interested members to make a quilt, 20" x 24", containing a self-portrait in caricature, in fabric, which exemplifies their personality. The Board voted and approved the proposal. Stay tuned--more details will be given when the Challenge is presented to general membership.

Documentation—Slots are full for next guild documentation in September. The next documentation day will take place in October.

Community Service—Phyllis Mitchell and Lisa Hall have volunteered to co-chair the Community Service Committee in 2016. Norm Horn will continue coordinating the dog bed program.

Hostess/Hospitality—Joan Johnson will chair this committee in 2016.

Newsletter—Judy McCoy reminded members newsletter items are due to her the Sunday after the OCQG Board meeting. **Membership**—Nan Scott will head up this committee next year and will recruit help.

Program/Workshops—Gayle Vaughn has volunteered to help the Programs/ Workshops Committee.

2016 Raffle Quilt—This quilt is coming together and projected to be done in January. Nan Scott had a photo on her iPad which she shared with the Board. It's going to be a beauty! Ten thousand raffle tickets will be ordered.

2016 Retreat—The Retreat takes place at the Oregon Gardens, Sunday through Wednesday, January 24-27, 2016. Nan Scott reported everyone had paid their deposit. Payment in full will be required at the December meeting. One person is on the waiting list.

2017 Raffle Quilt—We'll need to organize a committee soon. Don't forget--more than one idea for a raffle quilt can be submitted for consideration by the general membership.

The meeting adjourned at 11:50 a.m.
