QUIET QUILT HEROES

A little-known activity has been happening within the Guild which gives denizens of Sea Aire, an assisted living facility in Yachats, a hands-on taste of quilting, some stories behind the creations, friendship, and tasty treats.

It began with an invitation from Pacific Communities Hospital in 2006 to come to Newport Rehab (now Avamere) and share what we do; Jeanne Butler and Jean Maupin answered the call, accompanied by Jean's Texas grandchildren who were spending the summer. An employee from the rehab center was hired as Sea Aire's activity director, and she requested this group's participation in Yachats.

So once a month, usually on the first Thursday at 10 a.m., Jean—and often other guild members—gather, bringing quilts to show. Residents love to touch the creations and want to know why a person chose to make a certain quilt, how long it took to make and what members plan to do with the quilts. Sometimes this sparks the sharing of an heirloom quilt by a resident along with the story. Often there is a theme that relates to a holiday or a season. On occasion, a member is invited to share their special quilts. For example, Karen Donobedian kindly brought her turtle quilts to show. Once the Featured Quilter brought her favorite quilts. Sometimes guild members bring recent purchases from their travels and this often precipitates a story from the residents of their past travels.

Jean usually provides a home baked treat as well, be it a loaf of bread or some cookies. Friendships have formed and when a special resident is celebrating a memorable occasion, Jean often goes at additional times during the month.

If you would like to be part of this heart-warming outreach, the group would welcome your participation!

A KNOTTY REMINDER



BLOCK OF THE MONTH

This month we have a fun block—"We're All Ears"— that offers lots of room for creativity, and an opportunity to contribute to Community Quilts. You will learn how to use a lightweight interfacing (provided) to give a nice finish to the appliqué shapes. This technique works especially well on large, simple shapes like this bunny pattern. You will provide a light colored background block 15 1/2" x 9 1/2" and scraps for the appliqués that contrast nicely with it. You will also need a tiny bit of black for facial features, a tiny bit of fusible web and 3 strands of black embroidery floss for whiskers. Beyond that, your imagination does the rest. So here's the plan: each set of 9 blocks is enough for a small quilt. We will contribute the first set of 9 to a CommunityQuilt, draw a winner for a second set and so on. If 36people contribute blocks, we will have 2 Community Quilts and 2 winners. Let's get started.

1. Trace pattern pieces A and B onto the interfacing. Cut out each shape leaving a 1/4" seam allowance. Sew on the marked line all around each piece. Carefully clip the seam allowances being careful not to clip into the stitching.

(HINT: Begin clipping by making a tiny "v" in the seam allowance. It will tell you where to stop clipping) (HINT: If you have sharp pinking shears, you can eliminate the clipping by cutting out each shape close to the stitching line with the shears)

- 2. Carefully insert the tip of sharp embroidery scissors into the interfacing layer only and snip a "+" as indicated on the pattern pieces. Turn each piece right side out, smoothing the outer edges as you go. (HINT: a chop stick or a Purple Thang will make this step easier) Press each piece and set aside.
- 3. If you decide to make straight ears, repeat step 2 for each ear. If you want "bent" ears, substitute a contrasting fabric for the interfacing as it will show when you fold the ears down. Make two ears stitching, clipping and turning each one.
- 4. Fold the block in half vertically to find the center line. Lay the bunny pieces on the block starting with the body (piece A), then the head (piece B), slightly overlapping the two as shown on pattern piece A. Next place the ears. Here's where the fun begins. Decide how your bunny ears will lie on the block. Play with it until you like how it looks. Be sure there are equal distances remaining at the top and bottom of the block.
- 5. Pin all four pieces in place and sew them to the block, using matching thread and a machine blanket stitch. You could also opt for one of your built in decorative stitches or a straight stitch right along
 - built in decorative stitches or a straight stitch right along the turned under edge. If your bunny has "bent" ears, turn them down before you stitch.
- 6. Fuse the tiny scrap of fusible web to the black fabric. Cut out 2 eyes and a nose and fuse them to the bunny's face. (See cover photo) Using a narrow zig-zag stitch set on zero length, stitch the center of each facial feature to the block using black thread.
- 7. With 3 strands of embroidery floss, and using the cover photo as a guide, give your bunny whiskers.
- 8. Now comes the creativity. You can make your bunny into a boy or a girl with a bow tie or a bow on the head. Add an apron or an Easter egg or two. Give your bunny a flower or several of them. How about some ruby lips or eyelashes? Place your bunny off center and have another one peeking out from behind. Whatever you want to do to give your bunny a personality is good.
- 9. Sign your name on the back. This is important information for the label when the quilt is finished. This pattern was published in McCall's Quilting magazine Jan./Feb. 2013

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Minutes of the February 11, 2016 OCQG General Membership Meeting

The meeting was called to order by President Cindy McEntee at 1:00 p.m.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Cindy was enthusiastic about OCQG's annual retreat, the 2016 retreat just having taken place at the Oregon Gardens at the end of January. You get to meet a lot of members you might not yet know, and you get a lot done. On behalf of the atendees of this year's retreat, the following were presented with a gift for all their efforts in organizing and working to provide members this wonderful retreat: Nan Scott; Ginger Dale; Rose Shaw; and Georgia Sabourin. They each received a hand-made fabric collapsible container.

Cindy asked members to look at the bottom of the meeting agenda to find upcoming events, and reminded them to pick up their new membership directories.

Cindy acknowledged a number of "thank-you" letters recently received: from Mary Gilliland for the sewing machine, Sew-Ezi table, notions, and fabric after the loss of her home; from Avamere Rehabilitation of Newport for donations of quilts and bags; and from North Lincoln County Museum for quilts that our members provide which the museum displays, and our donation of \$200 to the museum's operating fund.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership—Gayle Vaughn reported 84 members in attendance, with one new member and six guests.

OCQG Mystery Quilt Along—Jennifer Reinhart told participants they will be starting to put together their Mystery Quilts this month. DO NOT CUT your three yards of background fabric you have in reserve! This month is the second month in which the instructions hold a clue to the mystery. Winners who brought in their last month's block were Rose Shaw and Judy McCoy.

2016 Challenge—Debi Koberstein filled in for Jeannie Singler and Benita Goodheart, co-chairs of the challenge committee. At the meeting, tickets were being checked out to members in lots of 18. Pat said we've received the city permit to hold the show, and we have the rack cards. Ruth Hutmacher talked about the Treasure Hunt activity during the show and how hard it is to find something for a child. She also needs people to sit at the Treasure Hunt table. Each month another quilt show committee activity will be highlighted.

Quilt Show Ribbons—Paulette Stenberg reminded members to purchase a \$10 ribbon, which you can award yourself to a quilt that fits the bill. YOU decide what you want to see in a quilt hanging at the show. Paulette said she and Karen Donobedian award a ribbon each year entitled "Ooh-la-la!" You will award your ribbon after lunch on the day the quilt show is hung.

Programs/Workshops—February Workshop—Pineapple quilt (not paper pieced); March—Quilted bags, several sizes; April—Fresh Flowers: Appliqueing with Wool. There is now a display board with all the workshops planned for the year so you can look ahead and get a workshop on your calendar.

SHOW AND SHARE

Quilts of Valor—Sonny Hanner showed three: one donated by Phoebe Hein; one made from blocks made by guild members; and one made for an Air Force serviceman. Sonny thanked the guild members for all their help. The Bay Shore Quilters took up the challenge to make baby quilts which will be given to all new mothers who have babies at the Newport hospital. Altogether, the Bay Shore Babes donated 28 quilts. Paulette Stenberg challenged the rest of the guild to make a new baby and mom happy—whip up a baby quilt! New member Sherry Lowery is coordinating the "Dr. Ken Stevens Memorial Box" for the Newport Hospital, which will contain an assortment of needed baby items. Sherry asks for baby quilts, baby afghans, etc., and these can be dropped off at Ruth's Family Fabrics, or call Sherry at 541-270-0345. You'll find her in the new OCQG Directory.

Judy McCoy showed a quilt centered around a fabric panel depicting a Japanese dancer similar to a painting she received from a friend in Japan. Nancy Terhaar showed her "Prairie Sweets" quilt, the center made from a pattern she won at the first retreat she attended. Karen Donobedian modeled her quilted jacket. She learned to fit it perfectly to herself at Becky Mershon's recent workshop. Paulette Stenberg showed three quilts she made for three nephews. Maureen Gallant showed a black and tan beauty, just back from Lisa Taylor's quilting studio. Toni Brodie showed a lap quilt she made for her husband, utilizing Crown Royal bags. The meeting adjourned at 2:40 p.m.

Minutes of the February 18, 2016 OCQG Executive Board Meeting

CALL TO ORDER

President Cindy McEntee called the meeting to order at 10:01 a.m. A quorum was present.

A motion was made and seconded to accept the January minutes. A vote was taken and the minutes accepted.

Treasurer's Report. Last month Board members had several questions regarding the budget sheet. Treasurer Pat Laub reported that the problems identified last month were resolved. Also, there was a difference in Retreat accounting, but working with the committee chair, that was resolved also. Pat also said she would get the original invoice for printing of the directories which Nan Scott had picked up.

OLD BUSINESS

2017 Raffle Quilt—Jean Amundson was happy to report that most of the pieced blocks have been returned, and the appliqué is coming along nicely.

NEW BUSINESS

Audit Committee Report—Fran Whited reported that Sheila Stevens volunteered to co-chair the Audit Committee, and together they performed an audit of OCQG's 2015 books, finding the guild's financial records to be accurate and neat. Discussion took place regarding deposits made with credit cards, now that we use the Square. Next year, we will be able to have more detail with the transactions. Also, efforts are underway to give members up-to-date information on how to get reimbursement for batting when donating a quilt to Community Quilts. Twy Hoch suggested we make members aware of this at the first guild meeting (Dec) for the year. Jean Amundson made the motion, Ginger Dale seconded, a vote was taken, and the audit was accepted.

Judy Niemeyer Mini Retreats—President Cindy McEntee is exploring the possibility of the guild offering two Judy Niemeyer mini retreats with Jan and Lou of JanniLou Creations of Philomath, OR. Tentative dates are May 6, 7, & 8, and November 2, 3, and 4. She has looked into having them at the Yaquina Yacht Club. This year, the retreats will be offered through the Programs/Workshops Committee, and they will have to be self-supporting, i.e., not subsidized by the guild. The pattern is called "Mistletoe and Holly," and the quilt and quilt top were both made by member Deborah Cagle. October is when we solicit ideas for the next year's raffle quilt, and members vote for the design they like best in November.

thanks to Marge and Don (who bring the cookies all the way from Florence) for the delicious cookies. She provided us with a recipe, at right.

MONSTER COOKIES

6 eggs 1/2 lb. peanut butter

1 lb. brown sugar (any style)

1½ tsp vanilla.9 cups oatmeal2 cups sugar½ lb. chocolate chips4 tsp baking soda.½ lb. M&Ms

½ lb. butter ½ cup chopped nuts

Combine eggs, sugars, vanilla, butter (softened), peanut butter. Add all dry ingredients. Mix well. Scoop to form balls of dough, then gently flatten on cookie sheet (can leave unflattened).

Bake at 350 degrees for 10-12 minutes. To make gluten free, use gluten free oatmeal. Can add raisins, craisins, and whatever, if desired. This recipe makes 8 dozen. You can cut the recipe in half for 4 dozen. Enjoy!!!

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
