NEW FOR THE 2016 QUILT SHOW


We will be offering "presale" admission tickets for you to purchase at the June and July guild meetings. These tickets will be available for you to buy to give to friends and/or relatives to see our show as your guest. Admission is \$6 for each day of our show. This is a really nice gift, as it also means your guests won't have to wait in line to pay admission to our beautiful show!

GETTING YOUR ENTRIES READY FOR THE QUILT SHOW

The clock is ticking.... All show entries must be registered by July 5 and must be turned in at the Atonement Lutheran Church in Newport on August 1, or to your depot chair (see OCQG website) by July 29 if you can't make it to the church. Here are a few bits of information to help you meet those deadlines:

- Don't be intimidated have your quilt judged! Only quilts that are judged are eligible for ribbons, but even more important is the assistance you will gain in improving your craft. The evaluation form that the judge will use can be found on the web (http://www.oregoncoastalquilters.org/Forms/eval_form_2016.pdf) or navigate: Quilt Show | Evaluation Form. Use it before submitting your quilt to be sure it represents your best possible work. It is an excellent checklist even if you choose not to have your work judged.
- Be sure your quilt has a 4" sleeve for hanging. Instructions for making the sleeve are on the web (http://www.oregoncoastalquilters.org/Show/QS-HangingSleeve.html) or navigate Quilt Show | Sleeve Instructions. Quilts without hanging sleeves of the proper dimensions will not be accepted.
- Save the confirming email you get from the registrar when you register your quilt. It has all of the information you will need when filling out your pick-up list and paper labels. The entry number will be added at Take-in.
- Paper work for turning in and picking up your entries has been streamlined. Be sure you download and complete the new insurance waiver and the paper labels for your items (http://www.oregoncoastalquilters.org/Show/QS-EntryForms.html) or navigate Quilt Show | Entry Forms. There is a fill-in form in Word that you can complete on your computer and then print or a PDF version that you can print and fill it in manually.
- The paper label should be placed in the lower right hand corner when looking at the BACK of your quilt. Just tack down the four corners with thread (no pins). There is no need to baste all the way around. Proper placement is VERY important because it saves time at hanging and take-down.

If you don't have access to the web or can't print any of the documents listed above, please call Nan Scott (541-547-5470) and she will print and bring to the next meeting for you.

BLOCK OF THE MONTH

Applique—Nouveau Flower

Our July appliqué block of the month (photo at left) will focus on two techniques. The first is using a transparent overlay to give perfect placement of all the fabric pieces. The second is fused raw edge machine applique. If you haven't already tried this process, you will be delighted with the results you'll achieve. I will provide the background block and the overlay sheet; you will provide fabric scraps for the flower and leaves. One lucky participant will win all the blocks in the drawing.



Pieced—Disappearing 9-Patch Star

The sign-ups are open for the Disappearing 9-Patch

Star. The block will be in patriotic colors and can be a star (top photo, right) or used as a border (bottom photo, right). Twenty-four of these blocks will be used to make a Quilt of

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MEET OUR MEMBERS

JAN HOFFMAN was raised in Portland, Oregon and got many of her sewing genes from her mother, who created outfits for Jan and matching ones for her dolls! Further learning occurred in the mandatory sewing classes in school but Jan and her sister (three years to the day younger than Jan) moved well beyond that level of accomplishment when they sewed pleated Pendleton skirts for themselves.

Jan married after high school graduation, and she and her husband had two daughters. Jan was a housewife and also had part-time jobs and was active for years as a Campfire troop leader as well as a volunteer at her daughters' schools. She worked at Jantzen Knitting Mills in Portland; there she learned how to make swim suits, bicycle shorts, and exercise wear. She also taught classes on sewing these popular items.



In 2001, her husband retired and they relocated to the coast in Waldport. Over the years, Jan said that she had made a few quilts but once here, she saw that Twy Hoch was offering a quilting sampler class in town which she took and subsequently joined the guild. She learned to hand quilt from Twy as well.

Jan has enjoyed taking guild classes—she mentioned ones by Barbara Shapel, Helene Knott, and by Cathy Ware. For years her workhorse machine was an aging Kenmore and only recently did she upgrade to a Bernina. She has also been active in the guild. She has been on the program committee, SABLE, and raffle quilt ticket sales. She likes *Love of Quilting* and *McCall's Quilting* and has learned from TV shows featuring Alex Anderson, Fons & Porter and Eleanor Burns.

Jan doesn't lack for sewing projects: she is finishing her animal totem, making a baby quilt for a nephew, a Hawaiian appliqué quilt for her bed, and finishing the wall hanging from April's class.

For little known facts about Jan, she and her husband were avid campers and backpackers. They rafted the Rogue River, and Jan even rode a mule to the floor of the Grand Canyon and back. Five years ago Jan hiked the 41 miles of the Rogue River trail with a group of female relatives; it took four days and Jan was the eldest of the group.

Once at home on the coast Jan and her husband began beach combing and decided to make items from their interesting and beautiful finds. They discovered a market for their creations and now, although widowed, Jan continues with this. She creates wire-wrapped jewelry, ornaments, and home décor items such as mirrors, picture frames, lamps and wreaths, which she sells in gift shops along the coast.

One more item on Jan's busy schedule—she provides childcare to her great-grandson two to three days per week. It has left me thinking are there enough hours in a day? Do you agree?



LUCY MILLIKEN grew up in northeastern Iowa in a family that eventually included five children. Her grandmother brought her into the sewing fold—she made clothes for Lucy, her sister, and her mother and bought Lucy her first sewing machine. Lucy says she has fond memories of twice a year going to the store with her grandmother and sister to browse through patterns, select fabrics, and then begin the wait as her grandmother worked her magic to make the outfits a reality. She eventually did make quilts later in life, and Lucy and other family members have some of her creations.

Lucy graduated from the University of Northern Iowa, married, and moved to Massachusetts where her husband began seminary. After one year they moved to Minnesota where he continued school and graduated. They then moved to northeastern Montana, which is where

their daughter was born. They subsequently moved to Spokane, Washington where they stayed for seven years during which time twin boys were born, completing their family. Next came a move to Silverton, Oregon where they stayed for 14 years. In 2008, they came to Newport where Lucy's husband became the pastor of Atonement Lutheran Church. When they came here, Lucy became a commuter between Silverton and Newport for a year and a half until they were able to sell their home there—tenacity!

Lucy over time had made a few quilt blocks for her own interest, so when she was invited to join the guild, she saw this as a logical step. She has taken some workshops during her six years of membership and made a top from a book she got from the guild library. She serves on the hospitality committee and, at the quilt show, she is in charge of the potluck we enjoy on set up day. Right now she is working on the mystery quilt and a black, white, and red quilt. She gets her inspiration from pictures and the guild show and share segment. Her stash is organized in bins in her sewing space, which also doubles as a guest bedroom.

Apart from her sewing and family responsibilities, she enjoys reading historical fiction, especially featuring the local area, and she is also a devoted dog walker!

The meeting was called to order by Vice President Phoebe Hein at 6:00 p.m. **ANNOUNCEMENTS**

A motion was made, and seconded, to accept the minutes from the April general membership meeting. A vote was taken, and the minutes

2016 Quilt Show—The next quilt show meeting is Thursday, May 19, at 1:15 p.m. at the Carriage House. Sue Stephenson stressed that it's getting to the point where all the quilt show committee chairs need to be at the meetings. Sue also showed the just released Quilt Shop Navigator which has the 2016 OCQG raffle quilt on the cover. Registering Your Quilts for the Show—Shari Stewart reported 45 quilts had been registered so far. Shari, Velma Freudenthal, and Sue Clark are working registration this year. When you register on the guild's website, you'll receive back a confirmation E-mail within a few days. There is a lot of good information on the site, and it is very helpful in registering your quilts. And remember, your quilts are worthy!

Minutes of the May 19, 2016 OCQG Executive Board Meeting

CALL TO ORDER

President Cindy McEntee called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. Some members were late in arriving, but a quorum was eventually present. Nan Scott made a motion to accept the April Executive Board minutes, pointing out one correction for a homonym error, "led" for "lead". Phoebe Hein seconded the motion, a vote was taken, and the minutes were unanimously accepted as corrected.

Treasurer Pat Laub handed out Treasurer's reports for April and May 2016. She had nothing out of the ordinary to report. Bills have been paid. After looking over the reports, a couple of questions arose, were discussed, and resolved. The Judy Niemeyer mini retreats will show as a separate line item in the future. Pat was able to advise on properly documenting revenue coming from the sale of the guild tables, CDs of quilt show photos; and also retreat deposits.

OLD BUSINESS

Sound System—It is still on President Cindy McEntee's agenda to do some research at the Guitar Store in hopes of finding a simple fix for our microphone interface with the church's sound system used at our General Membership meetings.

Judy Niemeyer Mini Retreat—Twenty-three quilters came to the mini retreat and started, or continued to work on, their projects—five were projects that only go to retreats. The mini retreat was a great success, with a number of new guild members participating. Sign-ups for the November Judy Niemeyer mini retreat will begin once the sign ups for guild retreat at the Oregon Gardens is complete.

Community Quilts—Lisa Hall is looking for suggestions for a new spot to work on community quilts the first Thursday of the month. Several suggestions were made. She reported that quilts were donated to "My Sisters Place," and some are going to Doernbecher Children's Hospital. Reimbursement amounts for batting was discussed; however, this issue was tabled until Lisa Hall has an opportunity to investigate the costs of batting and can suggest a standard, fair method of reimbursement.

NEW BUSINESS

Disbursements for Outreach Funds—Because Merchandising tied up a large portion of guild discretionary funds, we did not make enough extra this year to do any additional outreach funding.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Mystery Quilt Along—There was discussion on how to manage the July General Membership Meeting in a timely manner with big agenda items planned for that month, i.e., the Mystery Quilt Along, Self-Portrait Caricature Challenge voting, and quilt show. Jennifer Reinhart was not in attendance. The following suggestions were made: (1) Announcements and committee reports be kept brief; (2) The quilt show will be right around the corner, and the committee, by that time, will be finishing up the sign-ups for various volunteer activities, which is done during Table Walk and break. (3) The Challenge quilts will only be voted upon in June, rather June and July, as originally planned.

Documentation—Velma Freudenthal reported the last documentation session for the guild was cancelled due to lack of participation. The Oregon Quilt Project has offered to input "a box full of our quilts" on its Quilt Index. Velma is going to Salem on Saturday and will get more information on this opportunity.

Challenge—Jeanie Singler reported 11 self-portrait caricature quilts were turned in at the May General Membership meeting. Five participants have dropped out; she's expecting 13 out of 23 will be submitted for voting.

Membership—Nan Scott reported 217 members, with two renewal applications just received.

Merchandising—Cyndie Wenz and Jan McQueen have volunteered to work on the merchandising of guild logo clothing and fabric panels. Pat Laub is compiling an inventory of what we currently have. The question came up on ordering more panels—they are selling very well wherever the raffle quilt is being shown, and we could sell a lot of them at the boutique during the quilt show. Georgia Sabourin will assist Cyndie with the merchandise and will be at the Executive Board meetings to report. She'll need training gathering orders, selling apparel in the boutique, etc.

Newsletter—Judy McCoy reported 57 newsletters are printed, and 54 are mailed out to those who do not have E-mail.

Quilts of Valor—Two Quilts of Valor will be presented to two veterans during the quilt show, one who served in WWII, and one in Viet Nam. They must have served in a combat zone and now live in Lincoln County. Please send Pat Laub the name and contact information for the veteran you would like to receive this recognition.

Quilt Show—The Quilt Show committee was scheduled to meet this afternoon at 1:15 p.m. Sue Stephenson reported the Rec Center construction is projected to be completed this December or January of next year. The quilt show boutique and lunch rooms will have no windows this year because of the ongoing construction. They have promised no construction dust! Sue said things are going along as well as can be expected, but parking for the quilt show will be a problem. Sue had a plastic bag full of cut-away fabric pieces with the guild logo and was looking for suggestions on how to use them. Perhaps sewn on the aprons quilt show volunteers will be wearing?

Publicity—Jean Amundson will be getting out publicity on next month's "Melted Crayons" program with Terrie Kygar, and also on the raffle quilt. **Programs/Workshops**—Members will be able to sign up for the October workshop, "Secrets of the Quick Curve Ruler," with Dawn White, at the June meeting.

2017 Raffle Quilt—Jean Amundson reported all under control, no help needed at this point.

Raffle Ticket Sales—Janet Sylvester reported ticket sales are going good. The raffle quilt just left the "Purple Frog" in Jefferson, where lots of lighthouse panels were also sold, and is now being displayed at "Jane's Fabric Patch" in Tillamook.

This was tabled until June, once we have a better idea of what type of demonstration is envisioned.

You're Up! Be Ready!—Phoebe Hein presided over the May General Membership meeting and reported having the Show and Share participants lined up and ready to show their quilts was a big help in having the meeting run more efficiently.

Members Activity Booth—Sue Stephenson asked that a photo board of the Judy Niemeyer mini retreat group be made up and displayed at the guilt show's Members Activity Booth.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:38 a.m.
